

Monthly Mineral Quiz
The Monthly Mineral for November (Carnein photos and collection)







This month's mineral is one of those common ones that many collectors don't think about. It often occurs as pseudohexagonal twins (left and middle photos), but it's really orthorhombic (right photo). Excellent orthorhombic crystals are rare; the one above came from the Czech Republic. Fluorescent mineral collectors love specimens like the one on the left (from Sicily) because they fluoresce a beautiful soft red color. It has a vitreous to resinous luster, hardness is 3 ½ to 4, SG is about 2.95, and its color varies depending on impurities. This is another mineral named by Abraham Gottlob Werner (see below). Mindat.org (accessed October, 2023) lists only 36 Colorado localities, but there are probably many more where it has not yet been described. What is this common mineral?

Last Month's Mineral: Grossular



Grossular Ca₃Al₂(SiO₄)₃ is one of several common members of the garnet group. It was named by Abraham Gottlob Werner, a famous German geologist-neptunist from the Freiberg School of Mining, in 1803 for its color's resemblance to that of gooseberries, *Ribes grossularium*. However, as is typical of garnets, the color really isn't a very good indicator of species. It can sometimes be identified by its association with vesuvianite, wollastonite, sphene, and other calcium and magnesium silicates in metamorphic rocks derived from original clayey limestone ("lime-silicate rock"). You may have found it at the Gold City claims or at other occurrences in central Colorado. As in most garnets, the high hardness, lack of cleavage,

and moderately high SG mean that it sometimes occurs in placer deposits. When transparent, it makes an excellent gemstone (e.g., tsavorite, hessonite). It often forms well developed dodecahedral crystals, as in the example shown.







The Lake George Gem and Mineral Club is a group of people interested in rocks and minerals, fossils, geology and history of the Pikes Peak/South Park area, Indian artifacts, and the great outdoors. The Club's informational programs and field trips provide opportunities to learn about Earth science, rocks and minerals, lapidary work and jewelry making, and to share information and experiences with other members. Guests are welcome to attend, to see what we are about!

The Club is geared primarily to amateur collectors and artisans, with programs of interest both to beginners and serious amateurs. The Club normally meets on the second Saturday of each month at the Lake George Community Center, located on the north side of US Highway 24 on the east edge of town, sharing a building with the county highway shops. In the winter, we meet at 10:00AM. From April through September, we meet at 9:00AM, to allow more time for our field trips.

Our organization is incorporated under Colorado law as a nonprofit educational organization, and is a member of the Colorado, Rocky Mountain, and American Federations of Mineralogical Societies. We also sponsor an annual Gem and Mineral Show at Lake George, where collectors and others may purchase or sell rocks, minerals, fossils, gems, or jewelry. Annual membership dues (Jan. 1 through Dec. 31) are \$15.00 for an individual (18 and over), and \$25.00 for a family (parents plus dependents under age 18). New memberships and renewals are only accepted Jan 1 through March 31 each year.
